NEWSLETTER EDITOR Bo Nowell 919 280-1867 Bonowell@aol.com The N.C. Division of Marine Fisheries today announced that the 2023 recreational flounder season will open at 12:01 a.m. Sept. 15 and close at 11:59 p.m. Sept. 29.

CONTRIBUTING EDI-TOR

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The season will open with the following provisions for both the recreational hook-and-line and gig fisheries:

A one-fish per person per day creel limit. A 15-inch total length minimum size limit (from the tip of the snout to the tip of the tail).


Harvest of flounder with a Recreational Commercial Gear License will be prohibited.

The season and possession limits are set annually to



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keep the fishery within the recreational quota approved by the Marine Fisheries Commission in the N.C. Southern Flounder Fishery Management Plan Amendment 3. The plan also specifies any overage to the recreational Total Allowable Catch (TAC) requires a pound for pound payback subtracted from the following year's allowable harvest. In 2022, the recreational TAC of 170,655 pounds was exceeded by 56,340 pounds.

For 2023, this means the TAC for the recreational season will be 114,315 pounds.

Discard mortality is accounted for in the estimates of TAC. During 2022, dead discards both during and outside of the southern flounder recreational season contributed significantly to the total removals from this fishery and the overage in the TAC. For this reason, the Division

discourages anglers from targeting flounder for catch-and-release after they have caught their one-fish limit or when the season is closed. During the open season, the Division also discourages anglers from high-grading (retaining a fish until a larger one is caught) as this increases post-release mortality leading to additional PAGE 2

Mark your calendar... Old Drum Outing

SATURDAY SEPTEMBER 16th or SATURDAY SEPTEMBER 23rd (alternate).

Captains are encouraged to not only enjoy the adventure with their fishing buddies, but to also extend an invitation for others to join the crew. Please indicate your boat's name and how many additional fishermen, besides yourself, that you will be able to accommodate. If you have a full boat, please advise so that I do not put you down as having openings.

The plan is to launch from the cedar island boat ramp at: Location: 3619 Cedar Island Rd, 115 Driftwood Dr., Cedar Island, NC 28520

This is not a requirement. You may launch from any Neuse River Tributary (Pamlico Sound) including the Pamlico River. Kayak fisherman are eligible, you must declare your launch location.

The outing is set for Saturday, September 16th, but you may choose to prefish the area on Friday, the 15th...if you feel lucky. That will be up to the captain and his crew to coordinate. Only fish caught on Saturday will count for our "friendly" competition, 27" and larger are eligible for the competition.

The traveling trophy will be awarded during an upcoming club meeting to the boat catching and releasing the most "old drum" during competition hours. We are on the honor system. A catch means you were able to grab the leader defined as the required "Owen Lupton" style circle hook rig. You do not have to physically place the fish in the boat to count as a successful release.

Note that the time frame for fishing has been opened up from 5:00AM to 12 Midnight on the 16th to allow for daytime poppin' cork fishing as well as traditional nighttime cut bait fishing. Official VHF Channel is 10. Cell phone service in the area is spotty.

Fishermen will be expected to help with fuel and bait costs. You will coordinate those purchases directly with your crew. Trey Lowdermilk is the outing chairman. Please contact him with questions at 919-270-4120 or email at hllowder@hotmail.com.

RED SNAPPER SEASON INFORMATION

The 2023 recreational Red Snapper season will open this weekend for two days – Friday and Saturday July 14-15. The season officially opens at 12:01 a.m. on Friday, July 14 and closes at 12:01 a.m. on Sunday, July 16.

Anglers may keep one fish per person per day. There will be no minimum or maximum size limit. Captain and crew on for-hire vessels may retain the recreational bag limit. Anglers who donate a Red Snapper carcass will receive a citation (certificate) from the N.C. Saltwater Fishing Tournament.

The N.C. Division of Marine Fisheries will collect Red Snapper carcasses from recreational fishermen during the Red Snapper miniseason. The division has set up four temporary cooler locations in addition to the eleven carcass collection locations available throughout the year, where recreational fishermen can donate their Red Snapper carcasses. Learn more about what the division does with the carcasses on the Carcass Collection Program webpage.

CCA NC encourages anglers to use good release techniques when bottom fishing for red snapper and other species. One of the best options is the use of a descending device like the SeaQualizer Descending Device.

"The SeaQualizer Descending Device is a non-invasive, pressure activated tool that anglers use to ensure the survival of by-catch, or fish that are caught and must be released due to a size limit, bag limit or any other reason, that are suffering from barotrauma. The device comes in 3 configurations; Shallow, Standard, and Deep. The various configurations allow for the release of fish in 30' to 300'. We recommend setting the trigger depth as close to the depth of capture as possible. There are independent studies that show the efficacy of the SeaQualizer as compared to other traditional techniques and (Continued on next page)

you'll find that it outperforms the competition in every case.

We also offer the SeaYaLater Release Hook. This descending device has a unique twist to the hook release method in that it ensures a specimen does not fall off the hook prematurely during deployment. Follow the link below to a video of the SeaYaLater in use. The sliding swivel on one leg of the device allows the hook to invert when it breaks the surface of the water, going from an orientation that supports the specimen above water to one that drags the fish down once it's submerged. The SeaYaLater is the most user friendly of the release hooks on the market and does a great job of descending fish when used properly.

A common question we get revolves around the amount of weight required to get the fish down. We recommend 1-2 lbs of weight for every 10 lbs of fish but for really big grouper and snapper, all bets are off. It usually takes more weight than most boats carry and it's not unheard of for anglers to utilize their anchor the get the fish down.

Anglers use a variety of riggs to successfully release fish from downriggers to kite rods. The most popular method is to use as short a rod as possible with a slow, high torque conventional reel. Like a Penn Senator 113H2.

Marine Fisheries Division encourages anglers to donate Red Snapper carcasses to science

The N.C Division of Marine Fisheries will collect Red Snapper carcasses from recreational fishermen during the July 14-15 Red Snapper mini-season.

The division has set up four temporary freezer locations, in addition to the eleven carcass collection locations available throughout the year, where recreational fishermen can take their Red Snapper carcasses.

The temporary locations are:

Bridge Tender Marina, 1418 Airlie Rd, Wilmington Carolina Beach Municipal Docks, Carl Winner Dr, Carolina Beach Capt. Stacy Fishing Center, 416 Atlantic Beach Causeway, Atlantic Beach Carolina Princess Headboat Dock, 604 Evans St, Morehead City The year-round locations are (map available here): Oden's Dock, 57878 North Carolina Hwy 12, Hatteras Cape Pointe Marina, Harkers Island Frisco Rod & Gun, Frisco Jennette's Pier, Nags Head Eastside Bait & Tackle, Washington Dudley's Marina, Swansboro Pelagic Hunter Fishing Center, Sneads Ferry Sea View Crab Company, Wilmington Tex's Tackle, Wilmington N.C. Division of Marine Fisheries Headquarters, Morehead City Marine Corps Air Station Cherry Point - Environmental Affairs Office (available only to those with military base access) Anglers who donate a Red Snapper carcass will receive a citation (certificate) from the N.C. Saltwater Fishing Tournament.

When cleaning the fish, anglers should leave the head and tail intact and, if possible, leave the guts/reproductive organs in the fish. Anglers who fished on a charter boat or head boat should let the fish cleaner know the carcass will be donated.

Instructions on how to deposit the carcasses are posted on each freezer. Anglers will be asked to give information related to how and when the fish was caught. Fishermen also will be asked for their names and addresses if they wish to receive a citation. (continued next page)

Division biologists will measure the fish, determine the sex when possible, and remove the otoliths (ear bones) to determine the age of the fish. The information collected will be provided to the National Marine Fisheries Service for use in future Red Snapper stock assessments.

Recreational anglers also may log information about their recreational trips and catches through the MyFishCount electronic reporting mobile app. The app is available for free download at the Google Play and Apple App stores or through the MyFishCount website. Reports of the number of harvested and released fish will improve the accuracy of National Marine Fisheries Service's catch estimates.

The 2023 recreational Red Snapper season will open for two days – Friday and Saturday July 14-15. The season officially opens at 12:01 a.m. on Friday, July 14 and closes at 12:01 a.m. on Sunday, July 16.

Anglers may keep one fish per person per day. There will be no minimum or maximum size limit. Captain and crew on for-hire vessels may retain the recreational bag limit.

The commercial Red Snapper season will open at 12:01 a.m. July 10, 2023, with a 75-pound gutted weight trip limit. The season will close at 12:01 a.m. Jan. 1, 2024, or when the commercial quota is met (whichever comes first). Division biologists will obtain data from commercially caught Red Snapper at the fish houses. Commercially caught carcasses should not be left in the Carcass Collection Program freezers.

Gear regulations implemented in previous years for commercial, for-hire, and recreational snapper-grouper fishing remain in effect. The regulations require:

A descending device be on board and readily available for use while fishing for or possessing snapper-grouper species; and,

Use of non-offset (also called inline), non-stainless-steel circle hooks when fishing for or possessing snapper-grouper species with hook-and-line gear and natural baits, regardless of tackle or lure configuration. A non-offset circle hook is a hook with the point directed perpendicular back towards the shank, with the point and barb in the same plane as the shank (see diagrams). Offset circle hooks and stainless-steel circle hooks are not allowed for snapper grouper fishing.

For specific recreational harvest regulations, go to Proclamation FF-27-2023. For specific commercial harvest regulations, go to Proclamation FF-26-2023.

KING TIDES

King tides occur when the earth, the sun, and the moon are aligned. When the sun and the moon are aligned and moon closest to the earth, we get "king tides". The result is extreme high tides, and extreme low tides. This is because the gravitational pull is essentially "stretching" water on the earth. Seawater is then pulled in an upward manner causing higher tides in some areas and lower tides in others.

Knowledge can allow you to plan a trip to look for tailing red drum in spartina or avoid getting trapped fishing skinny water on a falling tide.
