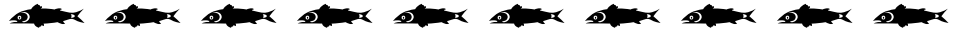

RSWSF Club Meeting Minutes July 19, 2022

RSWSF Club Meeting was called to order at 7:00 PM by club president Kevin Clemmer at NC State University Club. He reminded club members of ***Club Dues! And members must be current to VOTE and Run for the Board of Directors!***

Red Drum is the state fish of North Carolina. Drum vary in size from small puppy drum to mature Old Drum breeders up to 40 & 50 pounds.

Background: Most anglers have seen TV shows of tailing Drum in Florida and Louisiana but have not heard of or seen tailing Drum in North Carolina. Drum live inside the inlets in sounds and creeks until they reach 30+ inches. Once sexually mature these fish go out the inlets to join large schools that spend the winter in the ocean. Capt. Dean has caught a 35-pound Drum in 70-foot water near structure on the east side of Cape Lookout Shoals. Occasionally in the winter, schools of Drum come to the surf to feed. Large schools have been seen in the Bogue inlet area, along Shackelford Banks and Cape Lookout shoals.

July and August are the primary months that Red Drum gather along the NC coast where they enter North Carolina’s inlets such as Drum, Ocracoke, and Hatteras to spawn in the Pamlico Sound and Neuse River from July to September. These spawning fish are often caught at night on an Owen Lupton Rig designed for bull red fishing between 7:00pm to 7:00am as required by NC Wildlife regulations. It consists of a large circle hook with a smashed barb, a 6-inch heavy leader with a fixed position egg sinker 2-4 ounces as shown below in figure #1.



Daytime fishing one may use jigs and popping flies and North Carolina regulations allow an angler to keep one slot size Drum between 18 to 27 inches. Larger Old Drum are breeder class which are often targeted at night only for sport by using the Lupton rig baited with mullet, croaker, menhaden, or crab. The short leader with a bent down barb circle hook allows the fish to be caught without injury so it can be revived and released safely.

Capt. Dean fishes in Carteret County where he targets 1-to 3-year-old juvenile Red Drum this unique, because most fisherman generally target adult species of fish. Unfortunately, gill and flounder nets kill many Drum as bycatch in North Carolina; however, recent restrictions on the use of nets, closure of flounder fishing (Continued on next page)

and having creel and size limits has improved the Red Fish population.

Why Do Drum Tail?

When Drum are in shallow water, less than 24 to 30 inches they are feeding off the bottom, causing their tails to protrude and waive out of the water.

What Do Drum Feed On?

Marshes that flood on high tides are home to various crabs, shrimp, and small fish which are the primary food source of juvenile Drum. Red Drum can be found tailing at low tide on mud flats and oyster bars where water depths are only a few feet. (Capt. Dean explained how tide charts show various height changes and different tide depths as exhibited below in figure #2)

How Do You Fish for Tailing Drum?

Fishing for tailing Drum requires a lot of hunting, and once found comes the fishing. Fish from a shallow drafted boat or by wading. Capt. Dean uses a Maverick flats boat with a 21 foot push pole while he stands on a polling platform or his trolling motor in the shallow water to locate Red Fish without spooking.

The best tides are the exceptional high tides that flood the flats which only happens in summer and fall on days/months usually associated with New and Full Moon. Use tide tables to predict when conditions are perfect for tailing fish. Use internet sites such as: <http://tbone.biol.sc.edu/tide/tideshow.cgi>. Capt. Dean looks for high tides that exceed 2.3 feet above Mean Low Water. Some tides can exceed 3 feet. If water gets too deep on the flats one will not see the tailing Red Fish. (Tide Chart example Figure #2)

Once he finds tailing fish Dean targets an individual Drum and determine which direction it

is swimming then presents an artificial lure, fly or live bait about 3 to 4 feet in front of the fish. A cast bait should never move toward the fish! It is critical not to make unnecessary noises because these fish are easily spooked and will disappear. Sometimes the fish schools will reappear and come up within 10 feet away from the boat.

Windy days tend to limit the ability to see tailing Reds Drum. Dead calm days are ideal where every movement of the fish can be seen. Look for swirls, gulps, bait movement, and wave rings etc. Drum fish will usually swim toward the bank on a large grass flat as far as the water will permit.

What Bait for tailing Drum?

Spin fishermen can use artificial bait on a weedless hook or top water lures. Live bait or finger mullet also work well.

Fly fisherman 5 to 8 Wt. rod & reel with a good drag. Line: floating (top water flies) clear intermediate line with floating line. Leader: 7 to 9 Ft with 20-30 lb. tippet. Knots: loop knot to fly

Fly fishermen have an excellent opportunity by using a Clouser Fly with bead chain or lead eyes and a weed guard. Dean uses a single piece of 80 to 90 Lbs. mono for the weed guard. He suggests using any color that resembles a shrimp or mullet with some gold flash to get the Drums attention. Top water deer hair flies work great!

Best Tides to See Tailing Fish?

Often high tides occur after dark and there are many during August, September, and October where one has a good chance to find tailing Red Fish. Ideally, a few hours prior to high tide and a few hours after is the best fishing; therefore, a 4-to-6-hour trip is required to have the best chance of seeing and catching tailing fish. At conclusion the club raffled a guided fishing trip with Capt. Dean Lamont; it was won by a club member Tripp Adams.
