# Raleigh Saltwater Sport Fishing Club Weldon Shad Fishing Trip Saturday, March 23, 2024 Come fish from Boat, Kayak, or Bank!

Before we commence our fishing adventure, club member Victor Tucker has kindly offered to prepare breakfast for all attendees at the Ridgeway Volunteer fire department near Henderson, NC. The fire department is about 50 minutes from the boat ramp, a straight shot down Highway 158. It's an excellent opportunity to fuel up for the day ahead and engage in meaningful conversations with fellow anglers.

Please sign up, if you plan to join us for this outing and please indicate if you are joining us for the breakfast.

After fishing, several members have expressed interest in visiting the <u>Weldon Mills Distillery</u>, which shares a parking lot with the boat ramp.

## Additional Details:

Captains can organize parties to fish from boat, kayak, or bank.

Sign Up Genius will allow Captains to sign up first.

Then fishermen can sign up to join a boat captain on a boat, join a kayak captain with their own kayak, or join a bank captain to carpool to Weldon and fish from the bank. Fishermen are expected to help with expenses.

Each captain will choose where to rendezvous with their crew. Breakfast will be at the Ridgeway Volunteer Fire Department, 668 US Hwy 1 South, Norlina, NC 27563 Breakfast will be served from 6:30 until 8:00 am.

Fishing will begin whatever time you choose to get to the river.

Fishing will be in the NC Wildlife boat ramp and fishing area on the Roanoke River at Weldon, NC. Weldon is east of Roanoke Rapids NC, off I95 towards Virginia. About 100 miles from Raleigh.

Roanoke River Shad Regulations - **Roanoke River**: The daily creel limit per angler is 10 Hickory Shad and American Shad in combination, only one of which can be an American (white) Shad, in all waters and tributaries downstream of Roanoke Rapids dam.

Roanoke River Striper Regulations – Stripers season is closed for 2024!

Launching at the wildlife ramp is free, but can be very busy on weekends.

The Roanoke River is rocky, the bottom has much debris, and current can be swift. Use caution.

There are restrooms at the ramp.

## **OYSTER STEW**

As seen in @ourstatemag. Make this delicious stew with oysters from @mottschannelseafood! See recipe below.

Yields: 10 to 12 servings.

1 cup (2 sticks) butter 4 small onions, chopped 1 bunch celery, chopped 8 ounces sliced mushrooms 1/4 teaspoon minced fresh garlic 1½ cups all-purpose flour 1 (2-ounce) jar pimientos 1½ teaspoons thyme 1½ teaspoons pepper 11/4 teaspoons salt 8 cups milk 8 cups heavy cream 1 gallon shucked oysters with oyster liquor

Melt butter in a large stockpot over medium heat. Add onions, celery, mushrooms, and garlic, and sauté until tender. Reduce heat to low. Add flour, undrained pimientos, thyme, pepper, and salt. Cook for 3 minutes, stirring constantly. Add milk, cream, and undrained oysters. Simmer for 30 minutes or until the edges of the oysters curl. Do not boil. Ladle into soup bowls and enjoy!

Lee talked about finding the fish, using the right rigs, and just what it takes to get more and bigger fish in the boat. Several members of the club have fished with Capt. Lee and can attest to his ability to put you on the fish. ###

The weekend event kicked-off Friday morning when Salty Tapir, Steve Kuekes, and Jim Harding, Trophy, left Beaufort Inlet to test the waters. Both checked out AR 315 with no luck. The report was "its cold," actually 51 degrees out to the Big Ten Rock located south of the Northwest Places. There were plenty of dogfish sharks had between the two crews.

Dinner that night was at Cox Family Restuarant in Morehead City. I counted eighteen past and present club members. Everyone was sharing information. In addition to the Raleigh Saltwater Sportfishing Club, The Cape Lookout Fly Fishing Association held a meeting in the facility. This is a large familyowned restaurant that has been a go-to spot for locals since the late seventies. No one left hungry.

Weather dictated when and where teams were able to fish. Only a single boat launched on Saturday captained by Steve Kuekes, Salty Tapir, with Junior angler Gus Dammerman and Dan Dammerman. Weather limited the trip to the Morehead City Port wall. (continued)

Anchor911 and Robert Carroll departed Drum Inlet at daybreak. First stop 4-Mile Reef. No bites, cold water, but marked what they believe were trigger fish on the reef. Anchor911 moved on to the Chicken Rock where the water was 51 degrees; no bites. Anchor911 pushed on to another location and found a hot Red Snapper bite. The water temperature had risen substantially in just a few miles. Of most significance is the 1.5# Pinfish boated by Victor Tucker, Anchor911 (Photo attached). No black seabass. No catch to report from the Robert Carroll crew.

Emerald Mist and Horseplay elected a late start Sunday since the air temp was 38 degrees. Both boats meet at the Coast Guard Station at 10:20am and fished side-by-side the majority of the day headed south from Beaufort Inlet. The first stop was the West Rock, just passed the Big Ten Rock the other club members fished on Friday. The water was a few degrees warmer, however the bottom was wrapped up in non-target species. Horseplay did catch a single beeliner (vermillion snapper) which they released. Both pushed out to U-352 where the water temp was now 63 degrees. More non-target species to report. Both pushed further to the Schartz Wreck. Greg Brissette, Emerald Mist, boated what appears to be a record Sand Perch (photo attached). Both boats turned to make the loop home and decided to check out the Carteret County Sportfishing Association Artificial Reef. Good marks on the reef. Greg Brissette, Emerald Mist, boated a keeper seabass. Alton Annabelle, Horseplay, boated a 19" Black Seabass on a metal jig. Owen Lowdermilk, Horseplay, boated a 18" Black Seabass soon afterwards on cut squid. Emerald Mist moved on for the return trip. Horseplay remained and released a flounder, grunt, hogfish, ringtails and other non-target species. The bite was consistent

just not the target species. Emerald Mist stopped at the North-west Places on the ride in and reports a hot black seabass bite; just under the minimum size limit.

Next club trip Weldon, Roanoke River for Shad. April, Bonito and May, the coveted club Mahi challenge.

Reminder, register promptly for the club trips, even if you are not 100% committed. You can always back out with no penalty. Worst is that you will be added to the email distribution list for the outing.



# Marine Fisheries Commission advances Striped Mullet plan for departmental and legislative review

The N.C. Marine Fisheries Commission today took another step toward recovery of the striped mullet fishery, selecting its preferred management options for the Draft Striped Mullet Fishery Management Plan Amendment 2.

The commission selected the Division of Marine Fisheries' recommended management options, which were revised from what was proposed in November based on public comment.

The preferred management measures for the commercial fishery are estimated to generate a 34.9% reduction in harvest:

Saturday-Sunday Closure from Jan. 1 to Sept. 30.

Saturday-Monday Closure Oct. 1 to Dec. 31.

Manage the stop net fishery with the same measures as the rest of the striped mullet fishery.

The preferred management measures for the recreational fishery are:

Recreational individual bag limit of 100 fish.

Recreational vessel limit of 400 fish.

An exception for For-hire Vessel Operations to possess a bag limit for the number of anglers fishing up to the 400-fish maximum (including in advance of a trip).

Additionally, adaptive management is proposed for both commercial and recreational fisheries that allows the Division Director to use proclamation authority to adjust season closures, day of week closures, and trip limits.

The draft amendment is scheduled for final commission approval in May 2024. ###
